What is the role of ethics and political philosophy in public debates on immigration? The lecture aims to introduce students to key ethical positions and philosophical arguments in order to evaluate the justice and fairness of border policies. We will first discuss fundamental concepts, such as freedom of movement, immigration and the border. We will then examine the question whether states have a right to control their borders and exclude would-be immigrants. Thirdly, we will survey arguments in favor of more open borders and why democratic states have obligations to admit immigrants, such as responding to injustice and human rights violations, and furthering global justice.

The Philosophers' Sway between Change and Immutability

Does change require or depend on immutability? We can conceive of change in the properties a thing or a person, as long as it is the same thing or person that changes properties. Would knowledge be possible if everything is changing? Is the aim of science to reveal an immutable order in an ever-changing world? From Heraclitus' doctrine of universal flux and the Eleatic doctrine of the immutability of Being philosophers theorize in terms of change and immutability by imposing a dialectic sway between the two. We examine the various forms that the dependence between change and immutability takes, that is, as conceptual dependence, epistemological dependence, scientific dependence and question the possibility of applying such forms of theorizing to social reality. What would social change consist in? Could there be social immutables? Could there be knowledge of the social world and what is worthy striving for?

***Changer de regard sur la notion de changement?
Modèle occidental et modèle chinois pour
penser la décision***

Dans un texte de Borges, on trouve la mention d'une encyclopédie chinoise qui propose un classement qui vous paraîtra probablement loufoque des animaux en : a) appartenant à l'Empereur, b) embaumés, c) apprivoisés, d) cochons de lait, e) sirènes, f) fabuleux, g) chiens en liberté, h) inclus dans la présente classification, i) qui s'agitent comme des fous, j) innombrables, k) dessinés avec un pinceau très fin en poils de chameau, l) etc., m) qui viennent de casser la cruche, n) qui de loin semblent des mouches. Ce qui fait le charme exotique ou l'étrangeté de ce classement, c'est l'impossibilité pour nous d'organiser le monde animal selon de telles catégories. Il en est de même quand nous agissons. Nous mobilisons des règles dont nous ne sommes même pas conscients. Or, pour penser le changement, il peut être très utile de rendre explicite les règles qui président à nos prises de décision. En m'appuyant sur le travail du sinologue et philosophe F. Jullien, je vous propose dans cette conférence de confronter la façon chinoise de penser la décision à notre façon occidentale, comme on pourrait confronter les principes d'organisation de l'encyclopédie chinoise à nos encyclopédies, qu'on pense *rationnelles* ou *objectives*. Ce n'est pas seulement instructif, c'est aussi utile, parce que la décision est au cœur de nos vies, sorte de principe de liberté, possibilité de se donner des objectifs et de chercher à les atteindre. Bref, penser la décision est capital pour savoir comment conduire sa vie. Et la penser en prenant conscience de nos catégories mentales est encore plus important : c'est retrouver une ouverture plus grande vers des possibilités d'action et de développement qui sortent du machinal.

Plato Tackles Climate Change

When you look at an ancient bust of Plato, he seems aloof, distant. What could a stony-faced Philosopher from an alien culture and ancient mindset say to us about the modern climate crisis? Indeed, his theory of the Forms can seem maddeningly abstract, and his endorsement of a totalitarian regime does not give us a good first impression, if we are looking for a Philosopher to help us think through the very material and democratic knots that we wrapped up in over climate change. But, as you are probably aware by now in Philosophy. The surface of things is often misleading. Common sense is often mistaken. And so it is with Plato and Climate Change. Plato went through two major traumas in his early life. Behind the stony-faced bust there is a man who had to wrestle with dramatic and deeply painful experiences – the death of Socrates his teacher, and the war with Sparta. Behind the booming Athenian society, with all its incredible advances in art, culture, architecture, politics (... and all the rest), there were some major cracks that would be exposed. This lecture is about the boom and bust. Or perhaps more accurately, the bust in the boom. If we enter into dialogue with Plato carefully, the lessons that he learnt from the weaknesses of democratic rule and from his probing beneath the surface of things actually turn out to be sharply, wonderfully relevant for our modern climate crisis. The lecture will take place, "down at the Pireaus". See you there.

What Is to 'Change Your Mind' Morally?

We often talk about changing our minds on matters of both fact and opinion, and in doing so we often make reference to issues relating to evidence, or to other some consideration relating to feeling or a broader set of beliefs. With regard to changing one's mind on matters of belief, the process seems relatively straightforward since it appears that I can substitute an old belief, which previously I believed to be true but is now revealed to be false, for a new belief which can be demonstrated to be true. The transition from an old belief to a new belief appears to be relatively uncomplicated. But what is it to change one's mind morally? Does something similar occur? And what are the underlying processes that might characterize an agent's change (be it subtle or dramatic) of moral perspective? In this short presentation, these questions will be discussed with reference to the views of Aristotle, Hume, and Kant, philosophers who are selected because of their contrasting views on this issue. By putting these three thinkers into a critical conversation, it is to be hoped that some light can be shed on changes of opinion in morality, and how this issue is relevant to a more general understanding of ethics.
